It's easy to prevent pregnancy these days



In WA, about 1 in 6 girls get pregnant while still in their teens

About half of these pregnancies end in abortion



Promoting healthy behaviours

Knowledge alone is not enough



Promoting healthy behaviours

I - Information M - Motivation B - Behavioural skills **R** - Resources E - Environment



Motivation

- Personal risk
 - $\sqrt{}$ Lots of people just like them get pregnant
- Important to them to not get pregnant
 - \checkmark Consequences are personally relevant and serious
 - $\sqrt{\text{Benefits of using contraception outweigh costs}}$
 - Peer norms, social & gender expectations



Behavioural skills

- Make appointment, get to GP/clinic
- Get condoms / contraception and use correctly
 - Negotiate condom / contraception use with partner
 - Overcome resistance to condom / contraception use

Confidence to do in real life - and overcome any barriers

Information

- Unintended pregnancy is common
- Many methods of contraception to prevent pregnancy

How much detail about each method needed??



Efficacy of contraception methods Showing typical use for methods available in Australia

99%+

Less than 1 pregnancy per 100 women in one year



Contraceptive implant 99.95% effective Lasts up to 3 years



Hormonal Intrauterine Device (hormonal IUD) 99.8% effective, lasts to 5 years

Copper intrauterine device (Cu-IUD) 99.2% effective Lasts to 10 years



Sterilisation:

Male sterilisation (vasectomy) 99.85% effective / Permanent

Tubal occlusion by metal microinsert 99.8% effective / Permanent



Female tubal ligation 99.5% effective / Permanent



6-9 pregnancies per 100 women in one year



Contraception injection: Depot medroxyprogesterone acetate (DMPA) 94% effective Injection every 12 weeks



Contraceptive vaginal ring 91% effective New ring used every 4 weeks



Combined oral contraceptive pill (the COC Pill) 91% effective Taken daily with 24hr window



Progestogen-only contraceptive pill (POP) 91% effective Taken daily 3hr window

Diaphragm 88% effective



Male condom 82% effective



Female condom 79% effective



Withdrawal method 78% effective



Fertility awareness based methods 76% effective Abstain from intercourse or use another method on fertile days.

* Long-Acting Reversible Contraception (After procedure, little /nothing to do or remember)

Information

- Long acting contraceptives most effective
- Only condoms protect against STI
- Condoms only method young males can control & rely on
- Condoms plus LARC safest protection from unintended pregnancy & STI
- Emergency contraception (EC) for back up



Information

- Where and how to get condoms and EC
- See GP or clinic for hormonal methods or IUD, or discuss options
 - $\sqrt{\text{Under 16's can go to GP, clinic or SHQ}}$
 - $\sqrt{\text{Under 16's can consent to medical treatment if:}}$
 - Can fully understand the treatment and its consequences
 - Treatment in their best interests
 - $\sqrt{1}$ Then confidential
